New MBE awarded locally



As part of the St Ives branch of the Royal British Legion, we are intensely proud that one very special member was awarded an MBE in His Majesty's recent New Year Honours, recognising 40 years raising funds for the Royal British Legion and Royal Air Force veterans.

Warrant Officer (retired) Ed Kelly received his letter from the Cabinet Office days before his 101st birthday. He has held most offices of the Legion since his retirement from the Royal Air Force in 1982, including organising the Poppy Appeal, and he enjoys visiting schools and local cadet forces.

Having enlisted in the Royal Air Force at the age of 19 he trained in Canada. He then flew with several squadrons in Lancaster and Canberra bombers and became known as the most experienced navigator of those aircraft.

Notably among those squadrons, he was flying in the Berlin Air Lift from 1948 - 1949 and during the Suez crisis of 1956. He was with one of the 29 aircraft that attacked the Battleship Tirpitz in 1944 and was an operator on a Thor nuclear missile site during the dangerous Cuban missile crisis in 1963.

Ed was also awarded the Air Force Medal.

At 101, Ed is still an active committee member of the Legion and only recently ceased marching on Remembrance Sunday. He was provided with a seat this year but no, he stood throughout the ceremony and his main concerns nowadays are attending church whenever he can and helping to care for his disabled wife.

A hero? Most certainly.

May we also remind our readers that this year, 2025, there will be ceremonies to mark the 80 years since the end of the Second World War. What a privilege it is that we have Ed Kelly, one of a very few still with us to thank for their part in that conflict.

Then and now: technology

Stagecoach East is continuing to celebrate 40 years of serving communities in Bedfordshire and Cambridgeshire by showcasing the development of ticketmachine technology.

The bus operator has released a picture from its archive of a Setright ticket machine, which was once a well known feature of transport across the region. The portable Setright used a number of dials and a handle to crank out paper tickets to local people.

Whereas modern ticket machines are computer-enabled and can store hundreds of routes across different depots; they dispense tickets at the press of a button. They constantly keep track of where the bus is so that customers can see this information on the Stagecoach App. They also accept smart and contactless cards for ease of payment,



and ensure consistent pricing across the region. Messages can also be sent to Drivers through the ticket machines.

David Boden, Business Development Director of Stagecoach East, said: "As we celebrate 40 years of Stagecoach East/Cambus, it is important that we remember our heritage of such iconic items as the ticket machine. but also appreciate the modern technology which helps to get our loyal customers where they need to go as quicky and conveniently as possible."

Five top tips for injury-free training for the Cambridge Half Marathon

At least half of recreational runners are injured in the UK each year, according to research. So, if you are training for the Cambridge Half Marathon on 9 March, what steps can you take to avoid becoming one of the statistics?



1. Give your body time to adjust to training

Increasing distance and speed before your body is ready to do so – and not having enough recovery time in between runs – are common causes of injury. So don't increase your mileage by more than 10% in any given week, make sure you have rest days, and alternate speed and distance runs. Also, take time to warm up and cool down, which helps maintain flexibility.

2. Alternate runs twice weekly with strength and flexibility training

Running with muscle weakness and imbalances often causes overuse of muscles not strong enough to do the job being asked of them. An overuse injury is caused when the muscles have no time to adapt or recover between training. Ideally, you need to alternate your runs twice weekly with strength and flexibility training.

3. Wear the right trainers

Trainers are expensive but don't retrieve the ancient ones at the back of the wardrobe – or use the ones you wear every day to take

the dog for a walk. Get some advice from a proper running shop where they can look at your gait and recommend the appropriate trainers for your running style. And these are then your 'running trainers' only.

4. Pay attention to running gait

Familiarise yourself with some basic running gait knowledge or seek professional advice. For example, when striking the ground with the heel, having the knee too straight at impact will significantly increase the risk of injury. By not overstriding, you'll allow the knee to flex appropriately.

5. Don't ignore niggling discomfort

Ignoring an injury will not make it go away – so deal with any issues at an early stage. Seeing a professional will help you identify the problem so that you can rectify it. Nipping issues in the bud will get you back on the road and across that finishing line.

Do you know about the Community Car Scheme run by Huntingdon Volunteer Centre?

The Community Car Scheme is a volunteerrun service for people with mobility difficulties and those who need to make essential journeys (medical, shopping etc.) where there is no suitable public transport.

Huntingdon Volunteer Centre (HVC) is a local registered charity whose mission is to actively engage with Huntingdonshire communities by promoting and encouraging the involvement of volunteers in a variety of initiatives, including four Community Car Schemes. The charity also runs a Community Shop in Huntingdon (shop in person or online) which helps raise funds to maintain services.

Across Huntingdonshire the car schemes have an amazing 1,650 registered users. Volunteer drivers charge 45p per mile driven to cover their costs, plus there is a booking fee per journey of £2.00. While priority is given to medical appointments, HVC is happy to accommodate drives to social occasions too. All drivers are DBS checked, carry official identification and are fully insured.

One of the car schemes operates from the HVC office in St Ives Town Hall. Some facts: during financial year 2023-24 Fenstanton residents travelled a total of 2,590 miles over 129 journeys with the help of HVC volunteer drivers. There are presently 25 registered users of the scheme in Fenstanton and four of the registered drivers are Fenstanton residents. Hilton has one registered driver and 12 clients who travelled 994 miles over 27 journeys in the same period.

Book a drive by calling the St Ives office Monday to Thursday 12.30 – 3.00pm on 07582 211392 or 01480 301462, or online at stives@huntsvc.org.uk giving as much notice as possible, preferably 7 days' notice in advance. First time users need to fill in a



simple one-page form to register to comply with Data Protection regulations.

Fenstanton PC Welcome Space, working with HVC, currently offers free transport to and from the Church Centre for residents with mobility problems. For more information contact Roy roy.mcgee@ fenstantonparishcouncil.org.uk, tel 07949 453767.

Could you be a volunteer driver? There is no minimum commitment and no obligation to accept any drive. Non compulsory training courses are available.

One of the Fenstanton drivers told The Journal "Being a voluntary driver is a pleasure. I have met many lovely people and had some fascinating conversations. You can choose to commit as much or as little time to volunteer as you wish. Just committing to one short drive every week or two weeks would be a great help and it gives you such a buzz to think that you have really helped another person."

Drivers however are not the only volunteers sought in Huntingdonshire. HVC works to match personal skills and interests to the right local volunteer opportunities. It promotes the benefits that volunteering brings, both to individuals and to organisations in Huntingdonshire.

Forthcoming GPR Survey of Fenstanton Cemetery

As extensive searches over the last two years for a suitable plot of land for an additional burial ground in the parish of Fenstanton have so far proved fruitless, Fenstanton Burial Board has made the decision to carry out a Ground Penetrating Radar (GPR) survey of the present cemetery. As the graveyard around the Church is a closed graveyard, this area will not be included.

The cemetery is almost full and there are currently only about half a dozen known unused plots available and more plots are needed as a matter of urgency.

A GPR survey is to be carried out across the cemetery to attempt to establish the extent of unused plots. Historical records held by the Parish Council indicate the names of individuals who purchased plots, as well as those known to be buried in the cemetery. However, many individuals who purchased burial plots in advance may move away and be buried elsewhere, leaving their plots in Fenstanton cemetery unused. The Burial Board needs to establish where the unused plots are located.



The Parish Council's Burial Board assures residents that GPR is a totally non-intrusive method of locating unused graves. There is no need to dig or probe the ground. GPR detects only where the ground has been disturbed in the past, it does not show images of what is under the ground.

Hilton Community Garden

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


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I tread purposefully on the ground crushing long dead leaves that crumble to dust.

Scenting, marking, hearing. Sight imperfect; His monochromatic world is full of richness.



A history of Fenstanton Congregational Church

Today known as the United Reformed Church in Chequer Street

Historical records show that throughout the country many towns and villages, a company of Congregationalists and a company of Baptists would join together to form a church. Fenstanton was no exception to this.

Fenstanton's combined Congregational and Baptist Church met for worship in a building in Chequer Street, which later became known as the Sunday school. This big square were erected. In addition he donated; some say, all of the costs; others say two thirds of the costs; of the building work.

The total cost of the building of the church and the manse is believed to have been £2,000. This sum in 1874 is equivalent in purchasing power to about £283,427 today. So, Thomas Coote, in giving the land, plus his contribution to the cost of the building work, was extremely generous. In September



1874 Thomas Coote's son Arthur Coote, laid the foundation stone of Fenstanton Congregational Church.

It was in May 1875, that the church was opened for worship. (No long delays for planning permission 150 years ago). It is said that the church was built to seat three hundred people (not quite sure how this was possible).

Nearly one hundred years later, in October 1972, Fenstanton Congregational Church became Fenstanton United Reformed Church, when the

building still stands today next to the Blue Cow Air B&B. However, in 1874, following a strong clash of views and beliefs between the Congregationalist members and the Baptist minister, which was unable to be resolved; the Congregationalists, led by Thomas Coote (of Oaklands House), left the church in Chequer Street.

Thomas Coote was at that time a leader in the church life of the area; and at Fenstanton he was leader of the Congregationalists. Thomas Coote then went on to donate the ground on which the present building and the Manse Congregational Churches in England and Wales joined the Presbyterian Church of England to form the United Reformed Church.

Looking at photographs, little has changed in the appearance of the church from the outside, apart from the disappearance of what was described as the 'bell turret'. This was fifty feet high. Photographs of a wedding which took place in the mid-1940s show this bell turret, but people who joined the church in the late 1960s say it was not there then. So, at some point, but no one is quite sure when or why, the bell turret was removed.

The manse was used to house the resident minister until Fenstanton started to share ministry with St. Ives Free Church in the 1980s. With no minister of its own, the Manse was no longer required as a home for the minister. The ground floor however, was used by the church for Sunday school, meetings and social events and with no running water in the church, the kitchen and



toilet facilities in the manse were essential. The first floor of the manse was converted into a flat and let out. This continued until the late 1990s, when the manse was sold and became a private dwelling.

Whilst the outside looks virtually unchanged, the same cannot be said of the inside. In the late 1990s the inside of the church was, sadly, showing serious signs of wet rot. Something clearly needed to be done if Fenstanton United Reformed Church was to continue into the 21st century. Plans for refurbishment were drawn up and discussed and although there were some misgivings and unhappiness, it was agreed that the pews needed to be removed. The redevelopment is in evidence today. The church congregation met in the Parish Church hall for worship whilst the work took place under the watchful eye of Reverend Eileen Springbett.

In the year 2000 the church was reopened and what a transformation! The church now has running water – a kitchen and toilet facilities. The church is not only usable for Sunday worship but for a number of church events and is open for use by community groups throughout the week. Fenstanton United Reformed Church may have thought it was facing closure, but is now able to celebrate 150 years of worship.

In 2021 the overgrown grounds and unkempt rear of the church were given a

revamp during the lockdown. This created a pathway around the church for disabled access and also made a small memorial rose garden, using railway sleepers. Gravel was donated by Bannolds Aggregates for use as a soakaway next to the church walls. The area has matured into a garden of rose bushes bought by families of past members of our church.

Leonard Hurst in his 'A Historical Outline' written to celebrate 100 years, said, "Writing a brief history of the Fenstanton United Reformed Church is beset with difficulties because the available records are few and much is shrouded in mystery. But there are some things that stand out clearly: commitment, loyalty and devotion to Jesus Christ. This was the rock upon which the Christian Church was first founded.

This was also the rock upon which the Fenstanton Congregational Church (later the Fenstanton United Reformed Church) was founded. And yes, this is the rock upon which Fenstanton United Reformed Church has stood the test of time for 150 years with the commitment, loyalty and devotion to Jesus Christ of all the members and supporters, both past and present. And with God's help, the commitment, loyalty and devotion to Jesus Christ of members and adherents present and in years to come, will ensure Fenstanton United Reformed Church will be here to celebrate 200 years in 2074.

Paws for thought

How to chose a new puppy

Choosing a new puppy is one of the most exciting (and sometimes overwhelming) decisions you'll ever make. As a vet in practice, I've seen how those first few weeks can shape the long-term health, happiness, and relationship you'll have with your new furry friend. So, let me share some insider tips to help you pick the perfect pup while keeping their health and well-being in mind.

First things first: do your homework. Different breeds come with very different needs. If you're dreaming of lazy evenings on the couch, a Border Collie might drive you crazy with its endless energy. On the flip side, if you're an active person who loves walking and adventures, a bulldog probably won't keep up. Every breed has its quirksphysical and behavioural-that might align with your lifestyle or clash with it. Also, don't underestimate the power of good genetics and responsible breeding. Look for breeders who prioritise health testing, like screening for hip dysplasia or genetic disorders specific to the breed. Puppy farms, unfortunately, still exist and many puppies from these places come with hidden health or behavioural problems that can break your heart and come with significant costs to treat.

Here's a tip from me: check out the puppy's parents if possible. Healthy, friendly parents are often good indicators of a puppy's future behaviour and well-being. When you visit, also take a close look at the whole litter. Puppies should be bright-eyed, curious, and not overly timid or aggressive. Avoid pups that seem overly tired, sneezy, or have any signs of runny noses, diarrhoea, or bloated bellies—they might already be battling health issues.

Now, if you're considering a rescue puppy or dog, big thumbs up to you! Rescues centres are full of amazing pups just waiting for their forever homes. When adopting, ask about the puppy's history (if known), their current health status, and any medical treatments they've had. Keep in mind that some rescue pups might need a bit more patience and love to overcome rough starts in life, but the rewards are worth it. If you are working with a charity that has imported the rescue pup from abroad, make sure you ask for the testing that was done to rule out some nasty diseases that are not found in the UK currently, but can be carried by these dogs.

Next, consider your future puppy's lifestyle needs. Every dog requires regular exercise, training, and mental stimulation, but some demand much more. Be realistic about how much time and energy you can invest. Puppies are adorable little chaos machines they chew, bark, have accidents, and demand constant attention. Be prepared for a few sleepless nights!

Health-wise, be ready for vet visits. Your puppy will need vaccinations, deworming, and parasite prevention early on. Budget for these costs and set aside funds for emergencies, because even the healthiest pups can surprise you with unexpected vet bills. Nutrition is another biggie. Feeding high-quality puppy food designed for their breed size is key to avoiding growth issues like joint problems in large breeds.

Finally, think long-term. Puppies don't stay little forever. Are you ready to commit to 10– 15 years of care? Owning a dog is incredibly rewarding, but it's also a huge responsibility.

In short, choosing a new puppy isn't just about picking the cutest one (though that's definitely part of the fun). With a bit of preparation and a lot of love, you'll find a pup who's not just a pet but a cherished member of your family. And as your vet, I'm here to help every step of the way!

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Trains, Boats and Planes

The Black Cab Experience

Frank Bruno, well that's the answer! But what's the question?

Well, it's the question that every London Taxi Driver gets asked at least once a day, whether in the cab or not. It goes something like this "so who was the best celebrity you've had in the back?" Well over the course of my 15 years as a London taxi driver I had numerous 'faces' in the back (listed at the end if you're interested) but without a doubt Big Frank was the nicest and the one who I had the best chat with.

The second question is normally "so do you still have to do the Knowledge to be a cabby in London, what with GPS?" and the answer to that one is "yes".

The Knowledge - what's that all about? Well, The Knowledge is a unique test undertaken by Licensed London Taxi drivers to ensure that the driver of that taxi you're sitting in knows London like the proverbial 'back of his or her hand'. Nowhere else in the world are taxi drivers required to undertake such rigorous training before being allowed to carry fare paying passengers.

The Knowledge has been portrayed in a number of films and documentaries - but what exactly is it? Well taking Nelson's Column as the 'centre', a six mile radius is drawn. Within that six mile radius are approximately 25,000 streets, roads, avenues, lanes, etc. and 21,000 'points'; points being pubs, theatres, restaurants, stations, statues, blue plaques, hospitals, etc., etc. Basically anywhere a passenger could conceivably ask to be taken to - a 'Knowledge Boy' or 'Girl' has to learn and commit to memory the lot!

So you master that lot and you'd think that would be enough but, oh no, you then have to learn all the major routes out of London, in a 12 mile radius, but they make that part a bit easier as you don't need to learn any points and only the road 'number' such as A1 or A12, etc. Well apart from Heathrow Airport, where you have to learn all the major hotels. So quite easy then!

So there it is, the famous Knowledge, well nearly! I should also mention it's a test of character. But more of that later.

But why does The Knowledge even exist? Well the reasons seem to have been lost in the mists of time. However, there is some sort of consensus that in 1851, when London hosted the Great Exhibition, it was reported that people from all over the world complained about the ineptitude of the cab men, not knowing their way around London.

The authorities decided to do something about it and in 1865, the first incarnation of The Knowledge started.

On a personal level I was a civil servant for the first 25 years of my working life. Working my way up to have significant responsibilities in Whitehall. However, for a number of reasons I needed a change.

I thought I know what I'll do, I'll give up all my free time and most weekends to learn 25,000 streets and 21,000 points of London. Now just to convince my wife (and by the way we had two young kids at the time). For some reason she agreed - probably glad to get rid of me! Although we do celebrate 40 years marriage next year, so maybe I'm not that bad! after working all week, donning lots of layers to drive into London from our home in Hertfordshire. My wife even has a picture of me on a family holiday in Florida, sitting under a palm tree, revising points. How sad is that?

So how long did it take a civil servant, who really, really didn't know London like the back of his hand to pass The Knowledge? From start to finish, 5 years 6 months.

I also mentioned it's a test of character. Being tested on The Knowledge involves a one-toone interview with an examiner (many were ex City of London coppers). You apply for your first assessment when you think you are ready and when you think you've crammed all the information into the brain. In my case



I need to point out at this point that no one is paid to do The Knowledge and there is no time limit on how long a candidate takes. I once met a bloke who took nine years! No one actually fails The Knowledge, people just give up. They just can't take it anymore. As a Knowledge boy or girl your whole life is taken over, either driving the streets on your moped, staring at a massive map of London (in my old bedroom at my mum's house) or revising points. I even signed up to a Knowledge School where once a week I'd drive to East London after work to share hints and tips with others.

Without a doubt the worst part was getting up on a mid-winter Saturday or Sunday,

two years after starting.

Imagine how nervous you are? Stories of how strict. pedantic and rude the examiners are, were regularly shared at The Knowledge School. This is the day you've been working for, to finally start to move forward, fingers crossed! You must wear a suit and tie, have your shoes nicely shined and a good haircut. Examiners must be called 'sir' or 'ma'am'. You have a five minute window before your allotted time to enter the

building. Cafes around the area were always crammed with nervous candidates doing last minute revision.

This is how my very first assessment went so your name is called, 'morning sir', says I. Total silence. Ok, I think perhaps he didn't hear me. I follow him into the office and sit down. "Did I tell you to take a seat"? So I stand until told to sit. "Right, take me from the Serpentine Gallery to Claridges". The examiner has a map on a lectern to follow the route that I now recite. He's looking to make sure all the roads are named correctly and I don't make any illegal moves. I close my eyes to visualise the map and off I go, when suddenly he picks up his ballpoint pen and starts clicking the end and saying, "this is rubbish, you sure you're going the right way?" and then just as I was approaching Claridges he announced "oh sorry forgot to mention Stanhope Gate is closed today". I opened my eyes briefly to see a little smile appear on his face. Needless to say it didn't go well. "Well that was rubbish, come back in 56 days". I was gutted.

What you don't realise at the time, because you're so focussed on the map and list of points in your head is the examiners are seeing if you'll explode in a rage and tell him or her where to shove their ballpoint. Fortunately I'm really laid back, but I often wondered if the bloke who took nine years did actually tell an examiner where to shove his pen! The whole point being you do get people in the taxi who do wind you up, who question the route or how much it's costing and you just have to remain calm. That's what's being tested.

Finally on The Knowledge - if you ever get a London Taxi, don't be afraid to ask the driver how long they took to do The Knowledge as we wear it as a badge of honour.


Finally I'm out after 5 years 6 months, oh and an additional DVLA Taxi driving test, to make sure you can actually safely drive a taxi. As you might imagine there are a number of traditions to a trade that dates back to 1662. Number one being the first fare, in your life as a 'cabby', is always given free. I'll never forget my first fare - Kings Cross Station to Victoria Street Westminster or the look on the lady's face when I told her it was free. Another tradition is anyone going to or from Great Ormond Street Children's Hospital doesn't pay. Anyone in military uniform or going to or from barracks doesn't pay. The best tradition though is on Remembrance Sunday when taxis line up at all the major stations to ferry veterans to the cenotaph, then line up on Westminster Bridge after the parade to ferry them to their destinations - free of course.

I loved my time as a London Taxi driver (well apart from January and February in Lock Down when there was zero work). I had so many interesting people in the cab and had brilliant conversations with people from all walks of life from all over the world. The sights and events that I saw on a daily basis were amazing. Most days I'd come home to my wife and start our conversation with "guess what I saw today" or "guess who I had in the back". The only event I still try to erase from my mind though is the London Naked Cycle ride (which still takes place, every June or July, if anyone fancies taking part!). That one can still bring me out in a cold sweat!

'Faces' I recognised (I wouldn't recognise anyone off Love Island or Emmerdale for example) in the back.

We recently visited our family in Ireland. Flying on this occasion, finding the ferry prices beyond our budget, we delegated the task of online booking to our daughter, not trusting ourselves with 'the app' and fearing booking tickets to goodness knows where!

On the return flight Ryan Air proved very unforgiving. Insisting it was entirely our responsibility to read the small print (apparently on said app), our arrival at the boarding gate was greeted with a nonnegotiable extra charge because daughter had booked check-in bags. Ours were with us at the gate!

Despite costing the same, Ryan Air profited an extra £120 for moving two small wheelies from the gate to the airplane – about 100 metres. Thanks guys.

my many faults – no wailing or gnashing of teeth required, just a straightforward turning towards God, an honest 'l'm sorry' andopen sesame. Grace.

As 2025 rolls out, in the face of increasing uncertainty and instability in the world, I feel we will be needing a good helping. God has done his/her God part. The rest is in our hands.

Hilton Parish Church

Dear Friends,

'February fill-dyke': an old nickname for the second month of the year. I've always assumed that the name was given more or less



in gratitude, because of the blessing that full ditches and dykes and a wet end to winter would bring to the growing seasons of spring and summer. However, after prolonged heavy rain people often find themselves facing an excess of water that proves anything but a blessing – a flood, in other words.

For many of us in the west, much of the time, the stability of our habitat seems something we can take for granted. But it is an illusion. No-one who has experienced a really harmful flood, or any other natural disaster, is likely to give thanks for the suffering it brings, but if we learn from such events to think of our lives as transient, and to live in thankfulness for each moment of well-being, we shall have taken from them perhaps the only benefit we can. As we pray for those who suffer from an excess – or lack – of water, we can thank God for all the times and places where people have enough but not too much.

We come from water. All land creatures are descended from some unimaginable ancestors aeons ago who first left the oceans to try their luck on terra firma. The human embryo as it grows floats in the amniotic fluid of its mother's womb, and the developing lungs breathe no air but practice on the waters of this miniature ocean. Christians pass through the waters of baptism in a symbolic death and resurrection, and so receive the promise of God that life is not, ultimately, something that awaits the whim of arbitrary and uncontrollable forces but is drawn back to Him who first brought life out of the depths. "Never again shall the waters become a flood to destroy all living creatures," God said to Noah. Floods do still claim lives and always will, but the voice of God to all ages declares that His purposes for us and for the whole of creation are indeed, as He said at the beginning, very good.

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

January is finally over! With funds being a little tight still from the holidays and surviving what feels like a 8 week month, this craft is cheap and cheerful but lots of fun. This can be done with crayons, pencils, pens or paint on either paper, card or canvas, so hopefully you'll be able to get stuck in without the need to purchase any new items.



What you will need:

- Paint/Pens/Crayons/Pencils

- Scissors

Method:

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Afoot in the Garden

Spring makes an entrance

The transformation of our gardens from winter browns and greys gathers a pace in February. The promise of warming sunny days grows and grows until the day we all notice the world is green and lush again. A promise that starts with the snowdrops, crocus, winter aconites, dwarf narcissus, primroses, hellebores and friends.

Tasks for February include the spring tidy, winter pruning and seed sowing of half-hardy annuals and perennials. You can also spray roses, soft fruit and smaller fruit trees with a winter wash and horticultural disinfectant to help control pests and diseases. Bare patches in lawns can be repaired by lightly forking the soil and sowing fresh lawn seed (I always mix grass seed with John Innes seed compost). Lawn treatments can be applied once the soil temperature starts to rise, it should be at least 6C. Mild February days are also a great opportunity to give the garden a spring tidy, lawns edged and borders fed.

It's a rewarding time to plant as the moist soils and warming weather helps plants to establish quickly. Many 'summer impact' bulbs and corms can be planted from February onwards. These include lillies (I love the giants), gladioli, sparaxis, nerine and crocosmia.



A quick note about arches in gardens. It is tempting, especially in small narrow gardens to think a small narrow arch would work best. But in reality, it frames a garden as a portrait picture while wider arches create a landscape view and always make a garden look wider. I once had a client (Prof) who was quite adamant we replace a rotting narrow arch 'like for like'. Mrs (also Prof) won the day and we installed a wide arch. He rang the following day to say we had not only managed to make the garden look larger but the house as well!


Local Highways Improvement Funding Application 2025/26

Hilton Parish Council is taking proactive steps to enhance road safety and traffic flow at the crossroads by applying to the Local Highways Improvement (LHI) funding round for 2025/26.

The council has authorised the Clerk to submit the application, with a Parish Council contribution of up to £2,500 allocated to the project. The proposal includes two key elements aimed at addressing longstanding issues at the junction:

1. Realigning the Carriageway

The carriageway will be relocated towards the High Street to improve visibility for drivers approaching from St Ives Road. This adjustment is designed to enhance sightlines and reduce the risk of accidents at the junction.



2. Changing Priority Routes

The project will modify the current priorities at the crossroads. Under the proposed changes, traffic on St Ives Road and Potton Road will be required to give way to vehicles on the High Street and Graveley Way. This adjustment aims to reduce speeds and therefore improve safety at this junction, ensuring a safer and more manageable flow of traffic for all road users. The council recognises the importance of these changes for local residents and commuters alike. By addressing visibility and revising priorities, the project seeks to make the crossroads safer and easier to navigate. We will keep the community updated as the funding application progresses and will share further details about the timeline and next steps should the bid be successful.

Budget and Precept

The Council approved the budget and the precept as £39,826, which is an increase of £2,846 or 7.7%.

Churchyard Wall

Hilton Parish Council is working with Hilton Parochial Council to consider the renovation of the damaged sections of the church wall.

Pavilion Refurbishment

The Clerk is authorised to reapply for the funding for this project, to both the A428 fund and the CIL fund.

Highways Capital Maintenance

Cambridgeshire County Council has asked for suggestions for larger capital highways maintenance projects and the Parish Council has put forward the following suggestions:

- Resurfacing Scotts Crescent and Scotts Close
- Installing larger culverts under Kidmans, Tithe and Kidmans Farm Cottage
- Replacing collapsed drainage gulleys in the High Street
- Resurfacing the road to the Rectory

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New Year, new beginning

The first Monday of the New Year in the family law world is often referred to as "Divorce day". This is when there is a sharp increase in new divorces. Family law help at this time of year also encompasses the wider aspects of a separation including financial and child arrangements. The stress of Christmas often brings to a head issues previously brewing. Splitting up can be done inexpensively, but if you rush and make bad decisions, the costs can be high, financially and emotionally.

When seeking advice on ending your marriage and reaching agreement with your spouse over future arrangements, there are alternatives to traditional "lawyer to lawyer" negotiation and/ or formal court proceedings:

Mediation: Trained in conflict resolution and family law, a mediator facilitates discussions between you and your spouse and can inform you about potential financial and childcare arrangements, helping to reopen the discussion if things break down. This reduces your legal costs because you and your spouse shoulder the burden of gathering/sharing information yourselves, and while your mediator's hourly rate may not be any cheaper than those of your solicitor, you'll spend far less time together with the mediator.

Collaborative law: You and your spouse instruct solicitors and conduct discussions round the table with a commitment to resolving your differences without resorting to court proceedings. There will be the short term cost of instructing solicitors to help you reach agreement together, but if agreement is reached, you avoid the long term cost of drawn out litigation. Most of all, you keep control of the process, something that is lost the moment a court is asked to determine your future.

How to reduce the cost? - Avoid these mistakes

Unrealistic expectations. One household is about to be split into two. Unless you are very wealthy, expect money to be a little tight.

Getting into an endless battle. Turning the negotiations into a battleground will drain your emotions and your finances. Pick your battles wisely.

Getting hung up on the numbers. A fair split is not necessarily an even split. Two households will be needed. Priority will be given to housing any children.

Not listening to professional advice. If you are paying for legal advice, listen to it. The mediator, solicitor or collaborative practitioner will know more than your friends or family!

Fenstanton Community Grants

In November 2024, your Parish Council awarded two Community Grants. One grant, amounting to £300, was given to the Friendship Club. This funding will help cover the increasing costs of speakers and entertainers who provide entertainment, education and socialisation for the residents of Fenstanton. The other grant was for £1,500, awarded to the Bowls Club to assist in purchasing a reconditioned lawn mower. The club operates on a not-for-profit basis and has approximately 60 members, ranging in age from 10 to 94. They field teams in six leagues, ladies, men, and mixed, along with friendly matches. While the primary focus is on bowling and the club performs well in league play, it is also well known for its social activities and for fostering friendships, which is particularly valuable for many of its elderly members.

Cemetery clearance and hedge trimming

The Parish Council has recently taken steps to improve and enhance the appearance of the Cemetery. This work involved removing overgrown ivy, pollarding the lime trees, and trimming excessive hedges. More work is planned for the future to further improve the Cemetery's appearance. Additionally, the Parish Council has engaged Ray Puddefoot to design a plan for the neglected memorial garden.

Councillor Surgeries

These Councillor Surgeries were intended to give Parishioners an opportunity to pop in to discuss any issues they wish to bring to the attention of the Parish Council. We have observed that in recent months there have been very few visitors to our Councillor Surgeries. Therefore, your Parish Council will discuss at the January meeting whether these surgeries are still necessary or if they should be held less frequently. We will keep you updated on our decision through our website and Facebook page.

Land needed for a New Burial Ground – Can you help?

The Parish Council has been actively seeking additional land for use as a burial ground, but no suitable options have emerged thus far. If you possess knowledge of any potentially available land, please contact the Parish Clerk.

Your Parish Council will carry out a Ground Penetrating Radar (GPR) survey of the present cemetery, for further information on this survey, please see a detailed article in this edition of the Journal.

Fenstanton Parish Council – Budget and Precept 2025/26

Your Parish Council has reviewed the budget for the 2025/26 financial year to ensure we maintain the high level of service you have come to expect. In our budget considerations, we have accounted for anticipated increases in costs. Additionally, we will be taking on new responsibilities for maintenance, such as grass cutting, which was previously managed by the County and District Councils, as well as maintaining the underpass, which is currently under the jurisdiction of Cambridgeshire County Council. We have also included an increase in salary costs, a rise in employer National Insurance contributions and the clearance and improvement of the Old Orchard.

To address these additional expenses and avoid submitting a deficit budget, an increase of 15% from last year's precept is necessary. Therefore, your Parish Council is requesting a precept figure of £204,930 for the 2025/26 financial year. This will result in an increase of approximately £0.39 per week for households compared to last year.

Life on a Plate

Sticky, Dark Ginger Cake



Ingredients:

225g 8oz. Self-Raising Flour ³⁄₄ Tablespoon ground ginger Pinch of salt 100g. 4oz., Soft brown sugar 100g. 4oz., Margarine 100g. 4oz., Black Treacle 175g. 6oz., Golden Syrup 1 Egg 150ml. (5fl.oz.,) Milk

Method:

Line a 900g., / 2lb., loaf tin.

Warm the margarine, black treacle, golden syrup and sugar either in the microwave or a pan. Leave to cool.

In a large mixing bowl, combine the flour, ginger and salt.

Beat the egg into the milk.

Mix all the ingredients together.

Pour into the prepared tin.

Bake at 160°C fan, 180°C. for 45 minutes.

Notes: Do not be tempted to add any bicarbonate of soda or baking powder to this recipe. This recipe gives a well risen cake. Keep for a day or two for an even stickier cake (if it lasts that long).

Cheesies



Ingredients:

- 1 Packet Ready rolled puff pastry
- 1 Egg
- 1 300gram packet grated mature cheddar
- 4 medium sized potatoes
- A small amount of milk

Method:

Cook potatoes in salted water until soft and mash then leave to cool.

When cold, gradually add the egg beating the potatoes to combine.

Add the grated cheese, reserving a little to garnish

Unwrap the pastry and cut down the middle lengthwise.

Moisten the pastry with a little cold water and make a roll of the potato mix down the middle of each length of pastry.

Roll tightly and seal the edge of the pastry.

Dip the potato rolls into the milk / or brush with milk.

Secure a small amount of cheese to the top of each 'cheesy'.

Bake at 190 in a fan oven until golden -15-20 minutes.

Notes: Serve warm. Makes a very good alternative to sausage rolls for vegetarians.If there is mixture left when you have filled the puff pastry add a little flour to the potato mix, coat in a little flour (to prevent them sticking), before cooking and make cheesy potato cakes either in the oven or frying pan.

They leave such a hole in your life."

Sue Ellington's 2024 overview

The four-day week: at the start, the Conservative government threatened the councll with financial sanctions as it continued to pay staff for five days but allowed them to do all their work in four. However, the new Labour government took a more favourable attitude. I believe that in 2025 the four-day week will be confirmed for the future.

Community warden scheme: In 2024 Age UK Cambridge found their financial situation was frail and threatened to cease the servide. SCDC quickly provided £100K to retain the district's 18 schemes, whilst undertaking an independent review. The review report showed every pound the service cost provides £3.79 worth of outcomes. The council proposed a 10-year reducing scale of investment to ensure the schemes' sustainability but which needs to include other sources of funding.

Housing: The new government plans to increase housing, particularly social housing, and is changing the planning system to accommodate this. However, we need new sources of water and infrastructure before building more houses. The government must also ensure that developers do not land bank their planning permissions to keep house prices from decreasing.

Hilton Art Club – A History

Jackie Tevlin and Lynn Norton started the club in 2000 as Chairperson/Treasurer and Secretary respectively, as Lynn remembers "It all started after the Hilton Artisan exhibition in the village hall. Talking to a rather talented group of exhibitors, all from the village, we found out that this was a one-off ... and they didn't meet regularly. There was obviously a gap in the market there!"



They soon acquired members from the village and before long expanded the membership to include surrounding villages, meeting fortnightly during the school terms. We also had our first exhibitions. Jackie was a great mentor and enthusiast for the club and often organized 'competitions', with a small prize for the winner, of art materials, etc.

In the early years, a few volunteers would bring in still life sets and Jackie put on restful music as a background while we painted. We would also invite local artists to give tutorials occasionally, have outside painting and drawing visits locally and DVD tutorial art mornings in each other's houses. After receiving donations of art books, a library was created for members, which continues to this day. Jackie was a great mentor to us all and spent most of her time encouraging us.

By 2010, we met once a month. After celebrating 10 great years of the club, when Jackie and Lynn sadly stepped down, the committee kept it going for a short while, until Joanne Wells joined the Art Club. Joanne brought in new members and chaired it for



12 successful years, bringing her expertise and exuberance to modernise and introduce things like visits to Patchings Art Festival in Calverton, Nottingham and expanding our exhibition within Hilton Art Show, part of Feast Week.

In 2023, when Joanne had to leave us, Kathy Bateman became Chair and the club continues to grow and provide a place like-minded people locally can spend mornings (or sometimes longer, at our day workshops) enjoying painting and drawing together at any level, in whatever media they prefer.
